

Art is life. Art gives meaning to the mundane. I am sure these ideas are not new ideas but they resonate with me every time I walk around in this world.


One of my closest colleagues is the Director of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion, but she was also an art teacher, and art is her life. She reminds me that art is in everything.

MESSAGE FROM THE 15TH CHS PRESIDENT

Dear Central High School Alumni Community,

It is an honor to serve as the 15th President of Central High School, and a privilege to work with our incredible students and talented faculty daily. Central High School is known for its unparalleled academic learning, successful skill building and leadership development. Our leadership work with our students is implicit in every class, sports team experience, performance and activity.

So far, this year at Central High School has been one of accomplishment and recognition. Some highlights include:

- Central High School is a 2024 Blue Ribbon Award recipient. This is the 3rd time Central High School has received this incredible recognition. We are the only school in Philadelphia, one of 13 schools in Pennsylvania and one of 356 schools in the Country to receive this 2024 award.
- At the end of the 23-24 school year, 911 students completed 1852 Advanced Placement (AP) exams. 86% of Central High School students received a score of 3 or higher on their AP exam. This is the highest percentage in the last 5 years.
- 198 Central High School students took International Baccalaureate (IB) courses during the 23-24 school year. Our average IB diploma score surpasses the city, state and national average.
- We continue to have the largest offerings of advanced courses in the city of Philadelphia with more than 50 unique AP and IB courses offered.
- We won four Public League Championships during the Fall 2024 athletic season: Girls Cross Country, Boys Cross County, Girls Field Hockey and Golf.
- Eleven students received commendations in the 2024 National Merit Scholarship Program.

We look forward to the **Arts Department winter concert series in mid-December** as well as their musical production of Anything Goes in January 2025.

If you haven't returned to 1700 W. Olney Avenue in recent years, I encourage all **members of the AACHS to schedule a visit.** Central High School's tradition of excellence and opportunity exists because of alumni support.

ART EDUCATION AT CENTRAL HIGH

A FABULOUS HISTORY AND A LIMITLESS FUTURE

Art Education at Central High School - A Fabulous History and a Limitless Future

It may be a surprise to the general public and probably to many an alumnus to discover that a splendid art tradition was founded, grew, and is still maintained at Central High School. Let's explore our proud history of Art Education at Central from the opening of the school in 1836 to the mid-20th century. In the Spring edition of the Journal, we will explore through the current era.

1.Early Development of Art Education (19th Century)

Central High School was established in 1836, initially designed to provide a rigorous academic curriculum that focused on classical languages, mathematics, and sciences. As was typical for early American public schools, the arts were initially seen as less critical than traditional academic subjects. However, art history and drawing began to be integrated into the curriculum as part of a well-rounded education.

- In the mid-1800s, students were exposed to basic artistic principles, with a strong emphasis on drawing and sketching. This period likely focused on classical education, including the study of proportion, anatomy, and perspective in art, which was considered important for understanding European masterworks.
- Art education at this time would have likely been less formalized than it is today, but it laid the groundwork for future generations of students to explore creativity alongside academic subjects.

2. Expansion of the Arts (Early 20th Century)

As the 20th century progressed, the arts education landscape in the U.S. underwent significant change. The importance of art in public education was gradually recognized, especially in urban centers like Philadelphia, where cultural institutions such as the Philadelphia Museum of Art and the Barnes Foundation (**Dr. Albert C. Barnes, 92nd Graduating Class**) grew in prominence.

• Formalized Art Programs: During the early 20th century, art education began to evolve into a more structured curriculum at Central High School. This included fine arts courses like drawing, painting, sculpture, and printmaking, as well as the introduction of art history as an academic subject.

- Field Trips & Cultural Exposure: The school's
 proximity to the wealth of cultural and historical
 institutions in Philadelphia meant that art
 students frequently visited these museums and
 galleries for inspiration, contributing to a rich
 learning environment. Art history lessons often
 tied directly to these visits, helping students
 appreciate the works of famous artists.
- Integration of Commercial Arts: As industrialization continued, there was an increasing demand for commercial art and design skills. By the 1920s and 1930s, students may have also been exposed to graphic design and other applied arts, which had growing significance in a rapidly modernizing world.

3. Mid-20th Century: A Period of Artistic Innovation

The mid-20th century was a pivotal time in both American art and education. The rise of modernist movements such as Abstract Expressionism, Pop Art, and Minimalism had an impact on art education nationwide, and Central High was no exception.

- Expanding Curriculum: New courses were introduced in response to the evolving art world, including classes on modern art movements, visual composition, and multi-media arts. There was also a significant shift toward emphasizing creativity and individual expression, rather than just technical skill.
- Art Exhibitions: During this period, Central High students were encouraged to participate in art
 exhibitions and competitions. These events were seen as an important way for students to test
 their skills and gain recognition for their work. Some of these exhibitions were local, while others
 were national, contributing to the school's growing reputation for producing talented young
 artists.
- Community Engagement: Art students were also encouraged to engage with the broader Philadelphia community through public murals, collaborative art projects, and connections with professional artists. Some students were even able to intern with local artists or participate in art apprenticeships, helping them build career skills while still in school.

In conclusion, the history of art at Central High School in Philadelphia mirrors the evolving role of the arts in education itself. From its humble beginnings as part of a classical education in the 19th century, through its expansion into the modern and contemporary art world, and into the digital age, Central High has remained a dynamic and creative institution that fosters both artistic excellence and intellectual growth.



THIRD BLUE RIBBON FOR CHS

We are thrilled to share some exciting news—Central High School has been named a **2024 National Blue Ribbon School**, a prestigious recognition awarded by the U.S. Department of Education to just **356 schools** nationwide this year.

This marks the third time Central has earned the Blue Ribbon distinction, having previously been honored in 1987 and 2011. Central is one of only 13 schools in Pennsylvania to achieve this recognition in 2024 and stands as the sole recipient in the city of Philadelphia.

This latest Blue Ribbon designation for exemplary high performance is a reflection of Central's sustained academic excellence, built on the foundation of student achievement, faculty dedication, and a supportive community. At the special recognition ceremony, President Katharine Davis, 264, spoke to the importance and high honor of Central High School being named a National Blue Ribbon School:

"The Blue Ribbon Award is an achievement that recognizes the continued academic excellence of the Central High School student body as well as the dedication of our faculty, staff and families. This achievement memorializes the accomplishments of our entire school community, past and present." Assistant Principal Walter Myrick, 251, added:

"Central's recognition as a 2024 National Blue Ribbon School is a testament to the dedication and excellence of our students, faculty, and the visionary leadership of President Davis, continuing a legacy of academic achievement and innovation."

The legacy of Central's success is not only reflected in the achievements of its current students and educators, but also in the continued involvement of its alumni. I've been capturing moments through photography for years, starting with a 35mm film camera during my time at Central. My hobby has only grown stronger with time.


I'm excited to share three photos taken in Lancaster County, Pennsylvania.


The first photo captures a steam locomotive roaring to life at the Strasburg Railroad facility. I was exploring the train yard and happened to catch this moment by chance.










Music is and has always been the biggest thing in my life. I'm **Andy Niedermeier (278)** and I front the indie power-pop band Ghostship Dreamland, am the musical director for the absurdist multimedia art experience The Yamatorium, and play electric bass for up-and-coming baroque pop act Roseheath. Additionally, I accept clients as a mixing and mastering engineer, and do remote production for other independent artists.

I was deeply involved in the Central High School music department during my four years including being in the choir as a section leader for basses & tenors, and being in the spring musical every year. Working in music can often be chaotic, but these activities not only entrenched me deeper into the arts, but also helped teach me how to sing. As an example, I was cast as JoJo in *Seussical* my freshman year and then promptly, my voice dropped. It was a real battle to sing those high notes as my body was saying its last goodbyes to them. I also grew as a musician by taking electives offered by **Mr. Blazer** and **Mr. Franchetti, 255**, such as Guitar, Music Tech, and AP Music Theory.





I applied my passion for songwriting and production to other classes as well. After reading *Death of a Salesman* in junior year English with **Mr. Kannengieszer**, my final project was an original composition and recording of a psychedelic rock song called "Flawed" that I wrote about the play. Similarly, in AP Literature my senior year with **Mr. Hover**, my final project for our unit on folk ballad tradition was a rocked up cover of the 17th century English tune The Three Ravens. Having the opportunity to engage with my class material in creative ways helped propel my abilities forward. The two songs that I made for classes were among the first tracks I released to streaming platforms under the name *Andy Niedermeier*. This helped give me the necessary confidence in my abilities to write, record, and release music.

Currently, I am doing the majority of writing, recording, and releasing songs with my band Ghostship Dreamland. **My** main collaborator in the band is a fellow member of 278, mastering engineer and songwriter Jared Taylor. Jared and I met sophomore year in Central's production of *A Christmas Carol*, and our friendship has been very important in my life and also to the music we create. Ghostship Dreamland has been an outlet for me to place every hooky melody, glittery riff, and nostalgic swirl of guitar soup that crawls into my head. **Currently, we have a few songs on streaming platforms, have been playing local shows around Philly, and have an EP slated for release at the dawn of the new year (2025).**

Another musical outlet in my life is my role as Musical Director at The Yamatorium and its house band, Yam On!. While The Yamatorium is nigh impossible to describe with mere words alone - it is a family friendly art experience located in a basement space in West Philly, and the landing site of extraterrestrial rock star Lard Dog & his Band of Shy. It's a museum of bizarre sculptures, gallery for inkings and animation, and home base for a cast of absurd characters. I met the creator of The Yamatorium, Steven Erdman (aka Lard Dog) through my brother **Brian (282)** and we immediately connected over a shared set of musical influences and penchant for whimsy. In addition to my musical director role, I also manage The Yamatorium's digital presence, play guitar in live performances, and help write and produce songs for Yam On!

I am very lucky to be able to create music, and I owe, in no small part, those abilities to my time at Central High.

THE ART OF CLIENT SERVICE

After two editions, eleven printings of the second edition, more than 40,000 copies sold, and 12 years of being in print, I receive a form letter – yes, a form letter, addressed to "Dear Sir or Madam!" – telling me my then-publisher, Kaplan, is no longer interested in my book, *The Art of Client Service*.

I emailed my agent Jim Donovan, telling him "We'll need to find another publisher," only to have Donovan inform me, "Robert, I am no longer representing business books, and can't be of much help to you."

had a new book in the offing, which I raced to complete. That done, I wrote a detailed, 30-page proposal promoting it.

I researched agents, targeting roughly 20 who claimed interest in books like mine, who I then approached with an email that had this in the subject line: "A book with 40,000 copies sold, in search of an agent and publisher." Even with the lousy grammar – the book wasn't looking for an agent; I was – my note drew attention. A bunch of agents emailed back.

One of the bunch was Jeff Herman, author and compiler of an annual directory indispensable to anyone seeking to get a book in print, called, Writer's Guide to Book Editors, Publishers, and Literary Agents. To me, Jeff Herman was god. God took an interest, and pretty soon Herman supplanted Donovan as my agent. Now all that Herman needed to do was to find a publisher. That should be easy, right?

Easy it is most assuredly not, but among the people Jeff gueried with an email was Richard Narramore, a Senior Editor at John Wiley & Sons, the person most responsible for seeing that other advertising and marketing books found their way into print. Narramore is one of the few people in publishing who knows, understands, and respects advertising books. And he's one of the very, very few who has had success with them.

Richard was interested. Not interested in my new book, mind you. Interested in my old one. Would I be interested in revising and issuing a largely revamped third edition of The Art of Client Service? It took about, oh, one nanosecond to say yes. I wrote a new proposal; Jeff negotiated a new deal with Richard; I wrote a new draft, expanding the book from 37,000 to nearly 60,000 words, revamping its organization along the way, and, I hope, addressing what I felt were shortcomings with the soon-to-be officially out-of-print second edition (two days hence). What began as a dead-end, no-hope outcome evolved into something unexpectedly positive: I traded in a nearly anonymous agent for one widely known and well-respected, and exchanged a second-rate publisher – a minor company that is little more than a printer masquerading as a publisher – for a bigger, better, vastly more capable alternative. The third edition of The Art of Client Service has remained in print for more than eight years, claiming sales of some 24,000, making it one of the very few specialized business books to achieve numbers like this, with more sales to come as a solid, mid-list book for Wiley. In case you're wondering, yes, I am at work on a new book, called, Genius Needs Collaborators.

The company that I founded, Synergetic, is happy to help provide audio, lighting and video to the music industry. I am always honored that we get to be a part of the magic that gives audiences across the area a great experience. It gives them a chance to help share the art they are so passionate about. I love that I get to help share in so many wonderful experiences.

The **APIU/ASAO Showcase** in April honored the contributions of our Asian and Pacific Islander students, further emphasizing the importance of celebrating cultural heritage.


The first annual Hispanic and Latio Heritage Showcase created by **HLU**, **CIA**, and **SALSA** was a huge success.

Many of my classmates have taken note of this and deserted Philly's seasonal weather for the perennial sunshine, warming breezes and beach party bingo or mah jongg in tropical southern Florida. But while I type I'm listening to the news and worrying about my Floridian classmates, friends and relatives who were battered by Helene a couple of weeks ago and have now been set upon by her brother Milton. I'll check back in once I have a better picture of how my peeps weathered the storm.

The good news is that after hours and days of worrying, all of my Floridian classmates seem to have made it, although not all of their refrigerated and frozen foods did. There's a lesson or two here: 1) if a hurricane is forecast, eat the ice cream first, and 2) it may be time to move back to Philly even though winter is coming. And what about our classmates? **Paul Cherry**'s refusal to retire has its advantages. All his friends who tried to reach him during and after Milton just had to wait till he left jail, where he went to charge his phone, which had run out of juice. In the earliest days of my widowerhood, I spent time just listening to the echoes of my empty house. I was ready to give away all my suits and ties, which I used almost exclusively as court uniforms. Then I started getting calls from lawyers asking me if I was still working and if I could cover a court date for them. So I dusted off my jackets and ties and went back to work a couple of days a week. Pays for dinners out and then some.

Last nod to Class President **Eddie Anderson**, who, like myself, lost his soulmate of many years a while back and found himself rattling around his empty house. He's learning to replace the joys of marriage and cardiology with that of his children and grandchildren, not to mention vacationing with the whole family in exotic locales. He and I grew up rockin' to Bill Haley and the Comets' Shake, Rattle and Roll philosophy: Don't just sit there; get out in that kitchen and rattle those pots and pans! **Eddie** and I are still hangin' in there. **You too, I hope.**

CENTRAL HIGH SCHOOL DEDICATES NEWLY RENOVATED ATHLETIC FACILITIES HONORING TWO LEGENDARY COACHES

Central High School dedicated its newly renovated indoor athletic facilities on Friday, November 1st with many alumni and school community members present.

The dedication ceremony marked the culmination of an 18-month project, primarily funded by Central alumni, led by the **228th** class, in collaboration with Central's administration and the School District of Philadelphia.

The gym facility is named the "Art McNally Pavilion," while the basketball court bears the name "Coach Frank Greco Court," in recognition of two legendary teachers and coaches in Central High School's history.

Mr. McNally, known as Mr. Mac, while at Central, was inducted into the 2022 Pro Football Hall of Fame and has been credited as being the father of NFL instant replay.

Mr. Greco, a member of Central High School's 228th graduating class, was the first to coach a co-ed sport at Central. Mr. Greco led multiple championship teams in girls' basketball and softball, including a historic and astonishing record of 102 consecutive game wins with the girls' basketball team.

Naming these facilities after Mr. McNally and Mr. Greco reflects Central's commitment to athletic excellence and competition based on integrity, sportsmanship, and perseverance. More than the athletic successes associated with Mr. McNally and Mr. Greco, both individuals are known for making a difference in the lives of countless Central students.

The dedication ceremony featured remarks from School District of Philadelphia Superintendent **Dr. Tony Watlington Sr.** and Central High School **President Katharine Davis, 264**. Former Central students—including Coach Greco's daughter, **Christina Gabriel**, **260**—shared testimonials highlighting the lasting influence Mr. McNally and Mr. Greco had on their lives and sports careers.




