Dear Central High School Alumni,

I'm honored to lead an institution defined by academic excellence and innovative programming. Every day, our students and faculty demonstrate the values that have made Central a cornerstone of educational achievement.

This year has brought **exceptional accomplishments across our school community**. Our students continue to set new benchmarks in advanced coursework. At the conclusion of the 2024-25 academic year, 875 students completed over 1,700 Advanced Placement exams, with 89% earning a score of 3 or higher. These marks surpass last year's record performance. Additionally, 226 students pursued International Baccalaureate courses, earning diploma scores that exceeded city, state, and national averages. **Central High School is proud to maintain Philadelphia's most comprehensive advanced curriculum**, offering more than 50 distinct AP and IB courses that challenge students to reach their full potential.

Beyond academics, fourteen students earned commendations in the 2025 National Merit Scholarship Program, reflecting the caliber of talent within our halls. FROM THE ARCHIVES

One of the finest examples of **successful and consistent teamwork at Central High School** is “The Centralizer.” Since 1923, teams of writers, editors and other staff members have produced outstanding editions of our high-quality school newspaper.

The Centralizer’s first issue (Vol. 1, No. 1) was published on **Tuesday, April 17, 1923**. The top stories of the day included the need for a grandstand for the athletic field (at a cost to the alumni of \$5,000), the anticipated opening of the Barnwell Library, and the sale of base ball tickets (the word baseball that we know today used to be two words).

We are very fortunate to have a copy of the **first Centralizer in our Archives**. It is remarkably special that the eighth President of Central, **Dr. John L. Haney**, had the first four editors of the Centralizer sign our first edition.

Over the years, many of the Central students who worked on the Centralizer staff have applied their experience to real world successes. For example, **Rick Dunham of the 233rd** class, a recent Central Hall of Fame inductee, was the **Editor-in-Chief of the Centralizer** during his senior year at Dear Old High. Rick went onto be a world class, successful journalist and educator. Incidentally, both of Rick’s brothers, **Rob (234)** and **Will (238)** also served as the Editor-in-Chief of the Centralizer.

With the publication of its November 2025 issue (Vol. 151, No. 1) the hard-working team at the Centralizer continues to update students with **relevant reports about what’s happening at school**. They follow in the pioneering footsteps made by the Centralizer’s first team in 1923.

We know that Central has always had a great past, precisely because Dear High has always been about the future. **The Campus Expansion Project is critical to building and securing the future of Central High School.** The reality is that our building is nearly 100 years old, aging, overcrowded and inadequate to fully meet the needs of a 21st century Central education. To address these issues, we **MUST** build a new wing for the School to *enable us* to renovate and upgrade our current facilities, as well as providing a cutting edge new facility.

Members of the Alumni from across classes and generations have come together to form the **Leading the Way Committee** to raise the funds that we need from our Alumni to make this happen.

A labor of love, it is also a labor of necessity. And we've just scratched the surface.

Each contribution moves us closer to being able to provide future Lancers the space and resources they desperately need. We're making significant progress but we have a way to go to make this vision a reality.

- A new wing to be built on the North Lawn that includes a **400-seat, state-of-the-art, theater** that will be used for multiple purposes, including student productions, lectures, college fairs, exhibitions, and other events; acoustically optimized music, choral, theater, and dance rehearsal and practice rooms; digital production labs; visual arts areas and gallery spaces; and the re-location of the music and theater departments to the new wing, opening up space for the critically needed upgrades and renovations in the existing building.
- A **renovated and expanded STEM center**, a digital media center, and technology-rich research areas commensurate with the cutting-edge careers we want our graduates to be able to pursue in their future, made possible by the additional space in the existing building that the new wing allows.
- An **indoor walking bridge** connecting the new wing to the existing building; student commons spaces to allow Lancer students to have places to congregate, collaborate and spend their time in between classes; and a building-wide physical realignment, to enable related disciplines to be located in contiguous spaces.

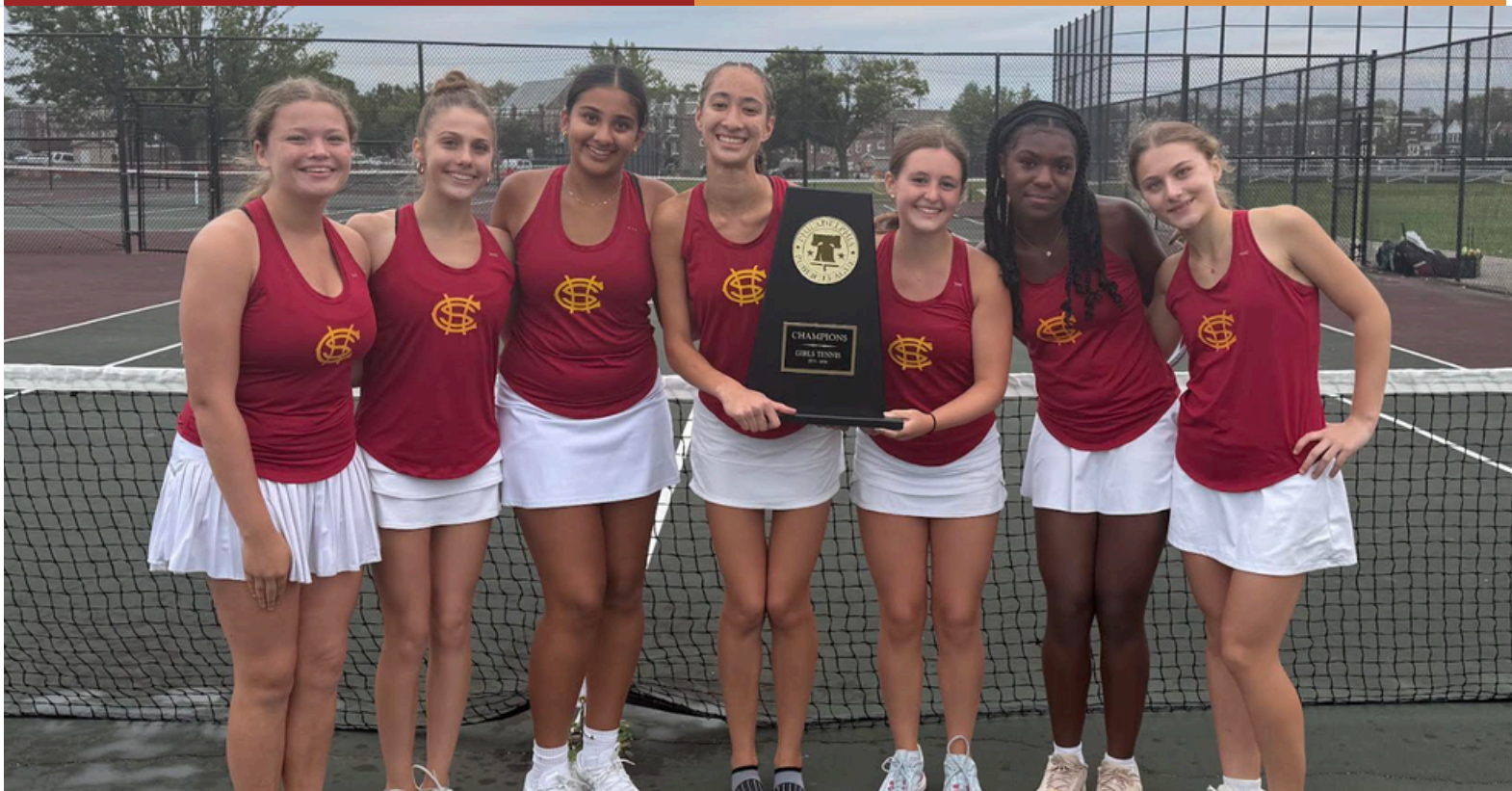

244 Sets Reunion, Gift Plan for Central | By Yvonne Dennis (246)



Forty years ago, members of Central High School of Philadelphia's last all-male class graduated into the world.

Many of those 230 or so men remained bonded through their love of sports, arts, service -- and the school itself. But life tests even the strongest of bonds. The 244 th graduating class has not had a reunion in a while, and that doesn't sit well with many of them. They are calling all of their brothers:

- **Saturday Dec. 27, 2025** The Renaissance Hotel, 401 Chestnut Street, Philadelphia
- **7 p.m. – midnight**, by **HardWork Ent., Come Kleen Prod., HomeBase**
- One-person ticket \$85 + \$7.55 fee. Partners are welcome.
- **To party, to remember classmates lost, and to raise money for Central.**

"Central was what I didn't know then but I know now," said one of the reunion organizers, **Darryl Cofield**. "Central gave me the tools that I needed to succeed, started that groundwork that I have. **The brotherhood. The sisterhood now.**"

Cofield, who works in retail management in the Philadelphia area, watched with pride as his daughter followed him to Central as a member of the **279**. Cofield played football and ran track at Central, and makes it to a fair amount of those same events these days "to lend support, give advice."

Also, he said, "I look up in the stands and say I used to be up there. This was me many, many years ago. I remember the traveling outside of Philly (as a player). Great times."

Central's current athletic director/football coach **Rich Drayton (246)** and track coach **Fred McCray (246)** are longtime friends of Cofield's, so when their teams fundraise he's always reached into his pocket. But Cofield and other reunion organizers—including **John Barber, Seth Williams, Keith Hodges, Larry Anderson and Rich Miller**—are cognizant that a public school in a building almost 90 years old has serious capital needs. So they have two specific ways for their class to have an impact.

Proceeds from the cost of reunion tickets after covering venue expense, food and souvenir will be appropriated in concert with the Associated Alumni of Central High School nonprofit and school leadership.

Second, Cofield said, classmates will be asked to pledge **\$244** each for giving. Deadline for giving and other details haven't been finalized for that part of the project yet. But Cofield has a message for why he hopes all classmates, whether they have continued contact with Central or not, will come to the reunion and engage in the giving effort.

"If anyone can **reflect on their experience and just remember the times they had**--good times, bad times, challenging times," he said. "I don't know any other high school alumni as connected as Central's. We're just all in. Just from that perspective, why wouldn't you want to give back? It obviously made them who they are."



FOCUS ON FILM & INCLUSION: A TRIBUTE TO REL DOWDELL'S (248) WORK BY LEN LEAR (209)



REL DOWDELL, 248

After graduation from Central High School in 1989, Dowdell received his B.A. in English with magna cum laude honors from Fisk University in Nashville in 1993 and a master's degree in film production with highest distinction from Boston University's film school in 1995. He won the top prize in filmmaking at Boston U's noted Redstone Film Festival that year.

"I didn't know I wanted to be a filmmaker," he told the Local, "until I got to college and read some articles about Spike Lee and John Singleton and how they took the educational route to filmmaking."

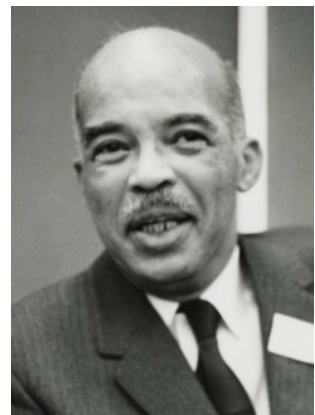
Dowdell's latest film, "Dr. Ira De A. Reid: Haverford College's Unsung Scholar/Activist," is a compelling documentary about the school's first African American professor who was hired in 1948. Reid chaired the department of sociology and anthropology until his retirement in 1966. Earlier in his career, Reid mentored the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. while working for the National Urban League and later brought King to Haverford for a special summer study program.

There were no Blacks, women, Catholics or Jews on the faculty when Dr. Reid was hired," Dowdell told the Local last week. "There was so much pressure on him to do well. Everybody was watching to see how he did. If he did not do well, who knows how many more years would pass before they would hire another Black professor? We tried for one year to get an interview with Cornel West (author of more than 20 books and recipient of more than 20 honorary degrees) for the film and finally did."

Once we got the big decisions out of the way – the Reunion Venue, Class Gift, a new Scoreboard, requiring we raise about \$40,000, the strategy to do so and basically how to operate, we went to work. We agreed to place an emphasis on regular communication via email, but also added regular Zoom Meetings, inviting all 234 members to get broader engagement, keep members posted, encourage communication with each other, ideas and for feedback.

We had **15 “All Class Zoom Meetings”** that were informative, helped with fund raising and planning, spurred ideas for the reunion and beyond, reintroduced folks to each other, and were just plain fun. The Zoom meetings solidified the idea of a **234 Golf Outing** organized and hosted by **Joe Pailin**, a lunch at Joe Abruzzi’s incredible Italian Market, (Abruzzi & Giunta’s Italian Market on Rt 38 in Mt Laurel, NJ) and numerous calls, emails and many one-on-ones or small group gatherings, while **reconnecting us all to our roots, learning about other classmates lives and more.**

The bottom line is the **234 Class** accomplished the following:

- 12 class members attended the 234 Golf Outing and 10 members attended the 234 Luncheon
- **40+ class members attended the School Tour** where we got to meet and interact with President Davis (**264**), the AACHS staff, current students, tour the School and hear about and see the legacy updated yet continuing.
- **Ninety+ attended the Reunion**
- We raised over **\$46,000 for our Class Gift of a new scoreboard**, with donations from over 100 class members and continuing.
- The **Mobile School Store** had a record setting sales night at the Reunion, in addition to sales prior to the Reunion of custom 234 hats and magnets
- There is on-going communication between class members and planning for **regularly scheduled smaller 234 events prior to our next Reunion**
- The **Scoreboard Installation** is still underway. Once this is completed, we will schedule a formal Dedication Event, with AACHS and the school. The event is tentatively scheduled for Spring 2026, with not only the 234, but the entire CHS and Philadelphia communities, to be invited.

Fine 239 Reunion Recap, Written by Rudy Cvetkovic

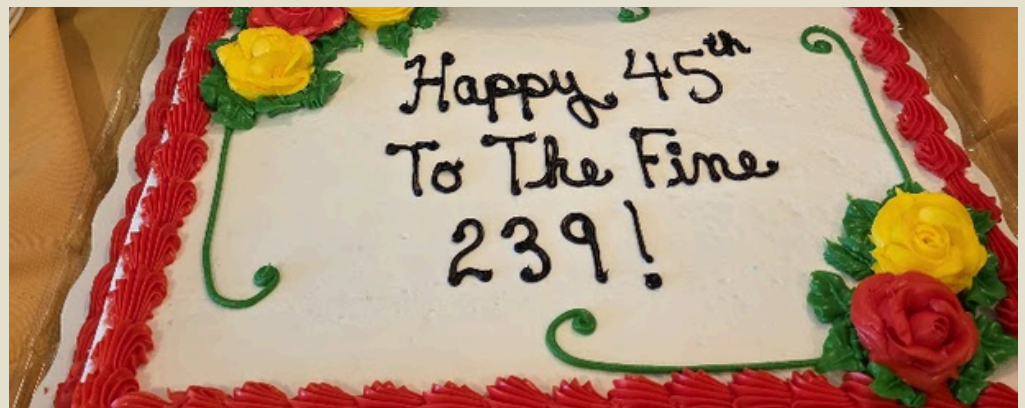
